Technology Focus: Airborne Self-Protection / Countermeasures



Electro-optical, infrared and radio frequency countermeasures cover a major portion of the electronic warfare spectrum applied for active self-protection against in-

creasingly sophisticated sensors and weapons. On the ground, the scope of active measures is complemented anti-missile defence systems whereas passive measures include decoys, armour protection, signature management and camouflage. ESD is published 8 times in 2017 with an additional special issue addressing the subject of “Defence Procurement in Germany”. Since January 2015, ESD has been accompanied by “ESD Spotlight”, a fortnightly online newsletter in English.
